Expectations and content

What is this unit about and why do we teach it?

 This novel is about the hardships of living through The Great Depression whilst delivering an untimely message about the importance of friendship. Students are able to see how an unjust society affects the characters through aspects of gender, race and age. The novel also allows students to understand the concept of moral dilemmas and how people are forced to make difficult choices.

If your child needs extension

Questions to discuss with your child:

- How do people in society still face barriers and prejudice?
- Will success always come to people who work hard and deserve it?
- Is it ever okay to break the law to do something you think is morally right?

Challenging activities to complete:

- Research the role of women and/or racial inequality in the 1930's.
- Create a backstory for the character Slim and how he came to live on the ranch
- Read Robert Burns' poem 'To a Mouse' and explore how the poem is significant to the novel's title (man/nature, suffering)

Suggested further reading:

• To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee The unforgettable novel of a childhood in a sleepy Southern town and the crisis of conscience that rocked it. The story examines the roots of human behaviour - to innocence and experience, kindness and cruelty and love and hatred.

• The Pearl by John Steinbeck

The story, first published in 1947, follows a pearl diver, Kino, and explores man's nature as well as greed, defiance of societal norms, and evil.
