# What is this unit about and why do we teach it?

Shakespeare's final play 'The Tempest' teaches us the genre of a romantic comedy. We also explore a deeper criticism of Elizabethan and Jacobean society. A ship leaves Tunis to return home to Naples however, they encounter a Tempest- a storm at sea. The survivors are washed ashore a (mostly) deserted island.
